

Our entertaining and informative illustrated talks are held on the second Tuesday of each month from October through to June. In the final meeting, there is an opportunity to hear a selection of

recordings that have taken the fancy of the society's officers following a short AGM. Membership is open to anyone interested in learning more about music.

Notable speakers in the past have included the composers John Rutter, Will Todd, George Lloyd & Geoffrey Bush; former Director of the BBC Proms, Robert Ponsonby; Lady Barbirolli, eminent oboist; Denis Matthews, noted pianist and Professor of Music; distinguished conductor Sir Norman del Mar and popular regular speakers such as Dr. Donald Hunt, Stephen Varcoe and Malcolm Goldring.



Our speakers this season feature two notable members of famous British orchestras: **Maggie Cotton** of City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra and **Kevin Morgan** of Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra. Both are world authorities on their orchestral sections, the former offering an insight into CBSO's recording sessions and the latter on the

workings of the trombone and life in the brass section of a renowned orchestra. James Murray returns to the Leicester Music Society with his talk on the sadly neglected composer Albert Lortzing. This is an opportunity, as with many of our talks, to expand your knowledge in areas you might not have considered before. A variety of works by Gerald Finzi, one of England's greatest C20th melodists, are championed by the great singer Stephen Varcoe [pictured above] who is a distinguished exponent of the composer's songs. Malcolm Goldring, a well-known choral and orchestral conductor, oboist, educationalist and adjudicator, returns with an in-depth study of how Rachmaninov, one of the greatest of the post-Romantic composers, wrote such wonderful melodies. Leicester's own John Florance [pictured below], one of the most distinctive voices on local radio, is a Renaissance Man in that his interests extend, beyond his encyclopaedic knowledge of music, to broadcasting, poetry, theatre

and detective fiction. His talk on Purcell promises to be a highlight of the season. The inspiration for **Chris Ball's** talk is a series of concerts held at Buckingham Palace between 1880 and 1899, featuring Queen Victoria's favourite composers. LMS's own Jazz genius, **Roger Wheeler**, highlights the importance of Duke Ellington's music in American culture.
